Minister's Notes

A chance to sleep in on Sunday morning? And still connect with our friends from the congregation, including a meal, some music, and an opportunity to put our faith into practice, out in the wider world? How is this possible?



On Sunday, March 18, 2018, we will not have [much of] a morning worship service*. Instead, we will gather that afternoon, do a little justicemaking with a

partner organization, and meet back at the church for a meal and some conversation about what we learned. This will be an explicitly multigenerational event—there will be many opportunities for our children and youth to be involved, as well as opportunities for every generation up to The Greatest.

Some congregations do this sort of thing regularly (recall my sermon from July 10, 2016, "Sabbath Kept for Realz!"), and find it invigorating. One congregation used this idea to reverse its decreasing membership, and is now growing again. We may try it a few more times, if we find it fulfilling this initial time.

*Of course, the church WILL still be open that morning. We almost always have a few visitors. If somebody needs a church that morning, we want to be there for them. With a few well-trained listeners, and some coffee and tea, any visitors should get their needs met (and may decide to join us for the justice work that afternoon!).

If you have an idea for a service project for that afternoon, or if you want to be part of the group that makes this event successful—or if you just have questions or concerns—please contact me.

Beloved Conversations in 2018-'19

I enjoy assembling models, reading, cooking, whatever comes along that interests me. I have an estranged son, a daughter, and a total of six grandchildren, four of which I do not

see due to my son. My husband David and I have been together for eight years and have been married for three and a half years. -- I appreciate the closeness and openness here at First Unitarian and the feeling of acceptance.

Ambroise Niyongabo My name is Ambroise NIYONGABO. I am from Burundi. located in the African continent, where I was born and raised in a Roman Catholic faith. Married and a father of four children, I found my own spiritual path when I was a student at the University of Burundi. In fact, one day, in a classroom, a professor of Introduction to Philosophy said: "what if it's a man who created God" You've never been told or read or heard that before, what would you do if you've only been told by your congregation that it's God who created a man? This insight stirred up a hook in my mind to reflect on my parent's faith (which was mine) and found my own spiritual path knowing that faith is a dynamic notion like knowledge as well. That's why, in 2008, I embraced a new faith in the Assembly of Christian Unitarian of Burundi thanks to a friend who has been the founder of that church in Burundi. As far as membership is concerned here and today, it would be a privilege and a pleasure to join this church seeking for "intellectual curiosity, moral values and emotional satisfaction".

David Roger Williams: I was born and grew up in Central Maine. Lewiston is the second largest city. I was an only-child born to parents who had been married late in life, and I came along 10 years later. My father was born in 1894 and my mother was born in 1905. They died of old age before my 40th birthday. I had been brought up a Roman Catholic by my mother and I later became a 'born-again' Christian. Sometime in my early 30s my Karma ran over my Dogma. I lean more toward Buddhist concepts and find nature to be spiritually enlightening. I have had a variety of careers, mostly in the social work/helping professions. I also worked for eight years with the Department of Defense, decided to go to college at age 42, and I retired as a Licensed Social Worker mental health therapist in December of 2016. I moved to

Indiana 20 years ago with my then partner who had been offered a hospital management position in Goshen. I met my husband Richard in 2009 and we were married in 2014 (although the following day we found that the Governor of Indiana decreed that we were no longer married). A short time later our Country reported that the marriage was legal and finally open to all adults. I have somewhat of a short history with the Unitarian Universalist church In Brunswick, Maine, and Elkhart, Indiana. I have always found a variety of like-minded as well as open-minded people within the UU family.
